In the last edition of the Vine, we explored what 'Harvest work' might look like for us as a Christian Community and how it could involve reaching out to others both inside and outside our community. In the New Testament of the Bible, there is a phrase that comes up quite a lot, and often in the Apostle Paul's letters. It contains a single word in the original Greek language. That word is *allos*, and it is translated into English as 'one another'. There are almost 100 occurrences of this phrase, for example in Romans 12:6: 'Be of the same mind as one another'.

There are a few common themes that can be seen throughout these verses. One third of them speak about unity within the community, another third teach us that we are to love each other. Half of the remainder speak about humility among believers and the rest address a wide range of other issues, including refraining from judging each other, bearing one another's burdens, encouraging each other and being hospitable to one another.

I find it quite exciting that in our College Community, we have the opportunity to do all of these things. There are many relationships within our Northside family through which we can apply the multitude of 'one another' commands. They do not often come easily and we need to work hard daily to challenge ourselves and each other to love, to be humble and to be in unity.

My encouragement is that, despite our imperfections and our mistakes, we continue to press on together to forge a strong Christian community based on these practical verses from the Bible. I encourage you to have a look through the letters from Paul in the New Testament and explore these verses so that we can all become familiar with what *Harvest* looks like for us all at Northside.

Year 5 Wildlife Sanctuary Excursion

On Thursday 9th May, the Year 5 students went on an excursion to the La Trobe Wildlife Sanctuary to learn about native animals and plants. As the school was awarded the Victorian Junior Landcare and Biodiversity Grant in 2018, the excursion was an opportunity for the students to learn more about the conservation of native animals that reside in the school vicinity. The highlight of this excursion was the assembling of nest boxes, which will be installed on the trees surrounding the College Oval. It was an excellent opportunity for the students to work in teams as they applied adhesive, drilled holes and positioned the pieces together, with assistance from the teachers and staff from the Sanctuary.

Part of the grant was allocated to the purchase of native plants and these will be planted in a designated area at the Oval. To ensure the native plants in this Bush Tucker Garden continue to thrive, the Year 5 students will be immensely involved in weeding and watering on a regular basis. Once the garden is established, this space may be made available to the local council, communities and even other schools near us. We look forward to the completion of the garden, installation of the nest boxes and doing our part for the community.



INSPIRE

Philosophy forms an important part of the quest to understand ourselves, our world and the universe God has created. As Christians it is essential that we can engage deeply with complex ideas in a complex world and ask big and profound questions about what we see, experience and believe. In the tradition of Socrates, arguably the most famous and influential philosopher of all time, Shemara (Yr 11), Gabrielle (Yr 12), Ms Eichwald and I had a discussion, something akin to a Socratic dialogue, about what philosophy is and the value it adds to our lives as learners and as Christians. This dialogue happened before and after the most recent Julie Arliss Academy Senior Philosophy Conference at Camberwell Grammar School on Friday 18th May. Topics included The Psychology of Outstanding Achievement (presented by Dr Christopher O'Neill, Oxford University); Knowing what you Know and What you Don't Know (Ontology and Epistemology); Politics of Tolerance and Freedom; Plato, Love and Relationships; and The Big Debate (that students should not be allowed mobile phones at school).

The discussion brought about the following ideas:

Ms Eichwald: "Philosophy is the love of wisdom. This is what we do: we attempt to become wiser by using reason to ponder big questions and different consequences of various actions. The Bible encourages us to be thinkers and to be able to respond to the hope that we profess and philosophy supports and guides our natural capacities to that end. The philosophical discussion allows us to ask and ponder the uncomfortable and difficult and complex questions that might otherwise go unasked in the course of the regular curriculum and the busyness of the modern classroom. Julie Arliss' conferences are terrific. They are so well prepared and students get to mix and interact with other students and schools."

Gabrielle: "Philosophy brings back the wonder of learning because it's asking new questions that spark curiosity; it goes beyond what we can directly see. It's just nice to be able to think for ourselves; so much of the curriculum asks us to memorise and regurgitate. It's nice to be left in 'the questioning', and not be forced to always have an answer for something. It makes it easier to discuss other things when we get back into the classroom: we can go deeper into thinking about things, and can get closer to the core of issues."

"We have to talk about the ideas that come up in these conferences because they're too big to come up naturally in day-to-day conversation. Because our school is so small, we get access to limited perspectives. When we mix with students from other schools, we are forced to open our minds to different points of view and patterns of thinking. These conversations wouldn't happen if it was just us at school; we need higher order thinking and to be in an environment where that thinking is welcome and encouraged. These conferences enable that space. Philosophy breakfasts also give a dedicated space for that conversation to happen, as these topics wouldn't ordinarily arise in regular conversations."

"I particularly enjoyed the lecture from Dr Christopher O'Neill from Oxford University; every day he is surrounded by this high level thinking and we have the honour of spending time with and hearing from such people who have so much to share from experience and expertise that we would not usually get to access."

Shemara: "I love philosophy because of all the new ideas and new concepts. It makes me think of new ways to look at the world. It expands my thinking. I like the new ideas that are presented at these philosophy conferences and the different perspectives that are explored. The philosophy breakfasts are also helpful in building community: they open up new ways of thinking about concepts and ideas and it means that we are all digging deeper together."

My favourite part of today's conference was the lecture on tolerance; I'd never thought about tolerance as a bad thing, but it was really interesting to see a new perspective on it: that tolerance silences debate, discussion and sharing of opinions conversation on a topic, and should be a mechanism not an end or goal. 'People who tolerate everything stand for nothing' - you need to be able to stand for the right things, not just say yes to everything and hope that problems evaporate on their own."

The residents and staff commented on how respectful and lovely students were during their visit. We look forward to continuing our partnership with BECC over the next few weeks.




Do It For Dolly Day





Building Traps to Catch the *The Enormous Crocodile*

Senior School Report

We are very quickly approaching the conclusion of Semester 1, particularly for students enrolled in Unit 1 and 3 subjects. Over the next week, students are encouraged to prepare a study schedule to plan their revision. They are encouraged to choose one topic in each subject to start revising. Revision can take many forms and students are encouraged to use the method that works best for them. For some students revision may consist of re-reading an English text, completing additional maths questions in the chosen topic, creating a glossary of key science terms or representing key dates in history on a timeline. If students need any assistance in planning their revision program, they are encouraged to speak to their subject teacher(s) or home group teacher.

YEAR 10 AND II MIDYEAR EXAMINATIONS

Midyear examinations have been scheduled between the 11th - 14th June 2019. A copy of the Year 10 and II Midyear Examination timetable has been distributed to students. WINTER SCHOOL PROGRAMS

There are a number of organisations that offer winter school programs to assist Senior School students with preparing for Unit 2 and 4 studies. These are optional activities that students may want to investigate to build on their learning at this point in the year. Furthermore, these programs can assist in preparing for end of year examinations. Additional details have been distributed to students during Senior School Home Group classes.



GAT ASSEMBLY

In order to prepare students for the General Achievement Test (GAT), the College is conducting an assembly with a GAT Briefing for Unit 3/4 students on Tuesday 28th May 2019. During this session, students will be provided with additional information about the format of the GAT. Students will also be provided with a GAT practice paper.



The GAT is an essential part of the VCE assessment procedure. All students enrolled in one or more VCE or scored VCE VET Unit 3 and 4 sequence must sit the GAT. Although GAT results do not count directly towards a student's VCE results, they play an important role in checking that school-based and external assessments have been accurately assessed, and in calculating Derived Examination Scores. No Unit 1 or Unit 3 VCE classes will be scheduled at Northside Christian College on Wednesday 12th June because the GAT is a 3 hour test.



VET TASTERS DURING JUNE, JULY AND AUGUST

VETiS (Vocational Education Training in Schools) can be an exciting pathway of education for students to pursue for one of their courses during Year 11 and 12. Doing a VET course will often help students make more informed decisions about course selections for VCE and post-secondary education. For this reason, we have invited the Year 9 and 10 students to attend up to a maximum of three Taster Days at the local VET venues during June, July and August. Taster Days give the students an experience of the course and help with decision-making for VCE subject selection. Students are advised that some sessions can book out. As a result, students are encouraged to register early for these sessions. Students are asked to speak with Mrs Lenna Waters to find out additional details about the VET Taster program. Christmas in June for the NCC-OCC Shoebox Collection


